This wintry weather is now reminding us that it is pruning time, and the roses are going into dormancy as the foliage begins to fall and just a few blooms remain on the bush.

We have a custom in the Illawarra to hold a <u>pruning</u> <u>demonstration in July at Peace Park</u> and rely on volunteers and those learning to come and prune the roses and demonstrate the art to those in the public wanting to do their own.

We very much enjoyed our June meeting with a very informative session from Gary Wootton on Green Manure. It is a great idea for renewing garden beds in preparation for new roses and other plants. It helps to not only nourish the soil but eradicate weeds at the same time. I sent information with the May newsletter on how to implement this strategy. Gary is also a master rose breeder and has produced some very impressive roses.

At the June meeting we will welcome Mark Massey from Mother Earth Nurseries who will bring along some of his plants and speak about roses. Mark has a vast experience in the florist rose growing industry, holds some of the rarer Australian Bred Roses and is an expert in the horticultural sphere. Please come along for a very good session and to ensure Illawarra's support of his long-distance travel to our meeting.

ROSE GARDEN IN JUNE

WINTER CARE FOR ROSES IN POTS: (By Lawrence Zammit)

In locations that experience snow and/or heavy frosts, potted roses are moved to a protected location like a greenhouse, garage, or unheated space. In the Illawarra where the winter is milder, the pots can be insulated with materials like burlap or bubble wrap but don't necessitate moving indoors. (this is also a great idea for insulating pots amid a hot summer).



Here's a more detailed breakdown:

1. Find a Suitable Overwintering Spot:

Greenhouse or Garage: A greenhouse or move the pots closer to your house or find a sheltered spot outdoors.

Sheltered Location: Look for a spot shielded from wind and extreme temperatures, like against a wall.

2. Prepare the Roses:

Pruning: Remove any dead or damaged leaves and flowerheads.

Mulch and Soil: Add a layer of mulch to the top of the soil to insulate the roots. You can also mound some soil

around the base of the pot for extra protection.

Decorative Greens: Consider adding decorative greenery between the shoots for added aesthetics. Bulbs can also be one way of showing off some flowers in winter – daffodils or hyacinths and other bulbs that will give a display

3. Insulate the Pots

Wrap with Insulation: Wrap the pots with materials like burlap, bubble wrap, or old blankets.

Crown Protection: If necessary, attach crown cushioning to protect the rose crown from frost. (This is particularly for those who experience heavy frosts.

4. Maintain moisture:

Maintain Soil Moisture: Keep the soil slightly moist, but avoid overwatering, as the rose won't be actively growing.

5. Watering:

Reduce Watering: Reduce watering frequency during dormancy as the rose won't need as much water.

Ensure Drainage: Make sure the pot has good drainage to prevent root rot.

6. Fertilizing:

Winter Fertilizer: Consider using a slow-release fertilizer formulated for container plants, or apply a liquid fertilizer diluted as per the instructions on the packaging.

7. Additional Tips:

Protect from Wind: Wrap the pot with burlap or other insulation to protect it from wind.

Lift Pots off the Ground: Keep pots a few inches off the ground to prevent root rot.

PRUNING TIME - Kristin

To refresh our memories- some tips on pruning our roses, now due between June and July in the Illawarra unless in a very frost prone area, then it is after the last frost most likely in august.


So in the garden this month:

- Keep making sure your roses don't dry out and have enough water
- Dead head your roses and use white oil to kill off any scale that can get on to the roses at this time
- Prepare the soil for any new roses you have ordered don't forget the Seamungus •
- The roses will be getting tall and straggly; don't worry they will be pruned soon; and you will find a lot more blackspot because of the cool damp weather. Don't worry pruning will happen soon and those leaves will be cleared.
- Begin to clean and sharpen your tools ready for the winter pruning.
- Check to see you have lime sulphur to spray on the roses after pruning
- Enjoy the last of your blooms before they are pruned off. Bring some to share at our next meeting. •

NOW TO PRUNING - IF YOU WANT A DEMONSTRATION- COME TO PEACE PARK ON 13 JULY. BRING YOUR SECATEURS WITH YOU AND YOU WILL SOON LEARN THE ART.

Procedure: Ensure you have sharpened tools - secateurs, loppers and pruning saws, methylated spirits or some other antibacterial substance such as tea tree oil for cleaning secateurs and other tools between bushes and after cutting diseased canes; plastic bag to place diseased leaves into; a bag for cuttings for compost bins; gloves, preferably elbow length for your own protection; a brush and some Eco Oil for cleaning off scale from trunk and canes; lime sulphur for spraying onto completed pruned rose.

PRUNE: Remember 4 D's - DISEASED DEAD DAMAGED DIDDLY BITS AND CROSSING CANES



Remove about half of last year's growth.

Remove interior crossing branches.

Remove sucker from rootstock.






Begin by cutting off the tops of the rose bush with the leaves etc., and remove leaves, place diseased leaves in a bag. Have a good look at the structure of the bush before moving on further. Suckers come from the roots under the bud union usually at an angle in the soil beneath the rose. Don't cut but pull the sucker out. Dig down if need be. Pick up leaves from under the bush and spray bush and soil around it with lime sulphur.

PRUNING OTHER THAN BUSH ROSES-

Standard Roses

We call "Standard" a rose grafted on a straight stem, so it looks like a ball-shape on top of a stick that can be 60, 90 or 120cm high.

- 1. Remove one half two third of the plant
- 2. Cut out any dead and old wood: it's your new season's wood that will produce flowers
- 3. Prune to the shape you like
- 4. Use a wire brush to remove old bark around the crown, to promote new growth. <u>Watch the Video</u>.

Climbing Roses

The general pruning rule of thumb mentioned for bushes and standards can have serious consequences for a climber and the approach needs to be quite different; it's more about training and shaping the plant, than cutting and reducing its size.

- 1. Encourage the central canes to grow towards the trellis or the support you want to use
- 2. Cut out any dead or old wood, as well as spindly and crossing over canes
- 3. Don't touch the new growth, as this will give you flowers the following spring
- 4. Remember that the main canes form the structure of the plant and the lateral canes produce the blooms. So, the main canes should be trained from the base to the top, allowing the lateral canes to grow horizontally from the base
- 5. Space the lateral canes 30-40cm apart, and secure them on the support with a soft tie or any material that won't cut into the rose cane
- 6. Look at the number of the main canes, decide which ones can be removed and leave as many as required to fill in the area (normally around 5 or 6)
- 7. Cut out the surplus lateral canes

For all kind of roses, always remember these **two important tips:**

- Do not prune roses on a wet or rainy day, as the cut area won't have that protective layer of woody cells that normally form in dry conditions and use a fungal spray after pruning.
- Be sure to clean up all the cut wood from beneath the rose you've just pruned, to avoid any potential disease during the growing season.
