So happy rose growing – fertilise with the rain, it will then soak in – and then wait for the beautiful deep coloured autumn blooms.

In your garden this month...

It is MORE OF THE SAME THIS MONTH -

- Dead heading your roses to keep them blooming
- Cut out any die back of canes and stems
- Fertilise this will be about the last of the fertilizing as we don't fertilise in any month that doesn't have an "r" in it – that's when the roses begin to go to sleep ready for the pruning time in June-August (depending on whether your have frosts in your area. It's good to get in and fertilise with rain so it is carried down to the roots.
- Watch out for scale on the lower trunk of roses and apply some Eco Oil, the cooler damper weather encourages scale, as also the black spot. Remove black spotted leaves and place in plastic bag and bin spray with fungicide and good luck.
- Bring in your roses to the house to enjoy and read about the best way to make cut roses last longer as Brian Wagner instructs us in his March newsletter.

Cut Roses - Looking their best for longer

At our Nursery we've noticed that, of all bloom flushes we have throughout the warm season, the Autumn one is the best.

Flowers seem to have brighter colours and stronger fragrance. We are not sure if it's the South Australian climate or it's the same everywhere, but our Autumn roses always look great.

We love mixing our cut roses with native flowers and leaves, and these are some easy and great ideas that <u>Cindy Cross</u> put together for us, to make beautiful <u>flower arrangements</u> with what you have in your garden.

Check the <u>3 videos</u> we produced with Cindy last year on how to put together a <u>beautiful bouquet</u>. But how do we keep our cut roses looking their best for as long as possible?

Brian suggests that you cut your roses from plants that have been well watered, as stressed plants will produce flowers that lose their petals more quickly.

If you can, cut the roses at the beginning of the day, and put them in a full bucket of water: leave them there for at least 6 hours to soak up as much water as possible.

If you want the rosebuds to open more quickly, add one tablespoon of sugar to every litre of water. Fill your vase with water at the very top and change it every day, to prevent bacteria building up in the water. To avoid bacteria, you can also use a professional preservative called Chrysal. (*Vinegar can also do this*) (*Wagner's Roses – March newsletter 2021*)

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MY FAVOURITE ROSE IN MY ROSE GARDEN

One of my most favourite roses I have in my rose garden, is called the "Champaigner" rose. I have this rose growing in pot that is located in my garden, where it gets full sun.

Prior to planting this rose in my pot I mixed a few handfuls of Neutrog Sea Mungus in with a good quality Rose Potting mix.

I also apply a diluted solution of Neutrog Strike-back for Orchids" every couple of weeks and also top the pot with "Neutrog Whoflungdung". The results are amazing!

The Champagner rose has beautiful crisp shaped cream buds that sometimes

exhibit the slightest pink blush and always looks so picture perfect! This variety of Champaigner rose is one the most selected rose amongst brides throughout the world due to its exceptional beauty and form.

What I really love about this rose, is its exquisite petal shape, form, its fragrance and it makes a beautiful bouquet of cut flowers which we often display in our home. When I walk past this rose as I conduct my daily rose inspection in my garden, I get the sense that everything is good and that nature can be so kind to us and produce such a beautiful thing!

St Patrick Rose - a rose that changes colour

Description: The mildly scented *St. Patrick™ Rose* is a Hybrid Tea Rose. Its common name arises from the yellow petals that take on a slight greenish hue as they age. It will bloom in flushes throughout the summer into autumn.



St Patrick was bred by American Rose grower Frank Strickland (1931 -2015). Frank was very much an amateur rose breeder who, like so many of us, began growing roses more by accident than design. In a new family home in San Bernadino back in the 70's he wanted to remove some sick looking roses but was stopped by his wife who insisted they stay until replaced. After falling in love with roses he began hybridising in 1984 initially with little success. He was determined to breed two roses that he could name for his two granddaughters. Like his falling in love with roses, his *St Patrick* rose was very accidental. It was a sickly- looking seedling with a cabbagey rose that didn't impress. However he kept it and the next year it produced what

we now know is the beautiful *St Patrick Rose*. *St Patrick* was bred from *Brandy* (seed parent) and *Gold Medal* (pollen parent).

The rose was named by the introducing nursery, Weeks Roses however the code name for *St Patrick* is "WEKamanda" honouring Frank's intention to name a rose after his granddaughter. Frank has one other named rose, *Spring Break* code named STRAheidi after his other granddaughter. Frank won several prestigious awards as an amateur or as he referred to himself, as an independent. Share roses brought along- whilst preparing to have lunch at 1.00p.m.


<u>Lunch 1-2.00</u> After lunch -a wholesale native plant nursery nearby (less than 5-minute drive). They have quite a good selection and most 140mm pots are \$10. Some members may also like to visit the nursery before heading home.

BRING ALONG: A light chair to sit on; a dish to share for lunch; your utensils, plate and mug; a rose to share, and most importantly yourself. Let us know if you need a lift down or up to Tomerong.



DIRECTIONS:

When coming South from Nowra, you will pass a United petrol station on your right-hand side some 12-15km from Nowra (depending on where you measure from). After passing the United, you will see a sign to Tomerong on your left on Hawken Rd. Take this turn and follow this road until you get to Tomerong village, then turn left onto Pine Forest Rd. Follow this road out of Tomerong until reaching Jerberra Rd on your right. Turn right, then Inglewood Crescent is the first on your right. We are the first house after the big left-hand turn. The number on the gate is 27. Google Maps says its #120. Do not follow the GPS to Parnell Rd as it is now a dead end. Phone Gary on 0414 514 215 if you get lost. You can drive up our driveway and park or park on the road. There is plenty of room, but it would be single file parking. Otherwise, park on the road and walk up the driveway.
