"Note from Esther": Re parking at 23 Ridgecrest Cordeaux Heights

Marked areas with pink rectangles to indicate where people can park, although you'll see it's quite limited. There is off-street parking, but not along the private driveway I share with my immediate three neighbours. The neighbour directly across has kindly said we can park up to their gate, which I've also marked with a pink rectangle.

If people need to park further down the street, it will mean a bit of a walk (and a climb!) up to my place. It might be best to drop off anyone with mobility issues at the top and then park down the street or consider carpooling if possible.

Wear comfortable shoes or boots as it gets very muddy at my place especially after rains so gumboots or shoes that is ok to get muddy with is a must!



Rose Growing Tips for September – (By Lawrence Zammit) –

As we approach the spring and summer months, we need to begin feeding with a balanced rose fertilizer as new growth appears, also applying mulch and watering deeply and regularly. Prune repeat-flowering roses in late winter before spring growth, and prune spring-flowering types after their first flush of blooms, always removing any weak, crossing, or spindly branches.


