Cultural Notes for April

GLYPHOSATE DAMAGE

Also known as Roundup damage. Glyphosate is the main ingredient in many herbicides (weedkillers). Many are not aware of the severe damage this product can have on roses. Glyphosate can drift long distances on the breeze to still affect rose plants — only a little is needed to cause

Symptoms include:

harm.

- · stunted and weak new growth and shoots,
- · tiny, discoloured and malformed rose buds
- rose buds not opening,
- · spiky, deformed growth

In severe cases, young or heavily sprayed roses will not recover.

If the damage is not severe, the best action to take is to remove any affected growth and water regularly. Keep removing the deformed growth as it appears. The best thing to do is avoid the risk completely. Use organic sprays or alternative weed killing options. Use a dedicated spray container for weedkillers.



Recently a cancer patient in America was awarded several million dollars in damages in a legal case against the manufacturers of Glyphosate, claiming there was a direct causal link between his cancer and the use of the chemical in his work. Other legal cases are pending.

TRANSPLANTING DURING THE GROWING SEASON

Sometimes in autumn you will want to move a rose to a better location, and it can't wait until the rose is in its winter dormancy. The plant will need soil to be kept around the roots. Any air getting to the roots during this time can cause damage to the plant.

Prune to at least half of its size, the balance of roots to growth will be important to make sure that the plant is not shocked too much but you do not have to do a winter prune. Your plant may wilt a bit or just sit for a few weeks once in its new location but if kept moist it will recover.

With climbers and weepers please keep at least three to four long young canes attached to the plant, although the lateral branches may be trimmed.

Get a long narrow spade and cut a circle around the plant about 45cm in diameter (the larger the better). Angle the spade slightly toward the plant to make the job of pulling it out much easier, although you will not need to cut directly under the plant. When lifting the plant from the ground, make sure you keep as much soil around the roots as possible - the more the better.

Place the plant with accompanying soil into a container for transport to its new location.

Replanting is a case of just digging a hole a little larger than the root ball on the plant and placing the rose into it. Make sure the rose is placed at the same height as the original planting. Back fill the hole and water in well, adding some seaweed solution to counteract shock.

Easter Recipe

Coming from a Greek background, my favourite traditional Easter treat of all, is the Greek Easter bread called Tsoureki. It's a bit like brioche and leftovers can be used in French toast recipes as well. I'm yet to find a gluten free version that is just as delicious but this is worth the effort.

Ingredients:

1/4 cup warm water

2 tsp instant dried yeast

1 tbsp sugar

3-4 cups bread flour

1/2 tsp salt

1/4 cup castor sugar

3/4 tsp ground mahleb or cardamom

Zest of one orange

60g melted butter

2 eggs

1/4 cup milk room temperature

Egg wash, sesame seeds or flaked almonds for topping

Method:

Mix together first three ingredients and set aside for 10 mins or until frothy. In a large bowl mix flour, salt, sugar, mahleb/cardamom, and zest. Add the butter last, once ingredients are combined. You can use a dough hook mixer for 10 mins or knead by hand for 15 mins. Keep dough moist and sticky but just workable. Transfer dough in a lightly oiled bowl, cover with plastic and set aside in a warm place for 2-3 hours, or until doubled in size. Once ready, knock down dough and divide into 3 equal portions. Roll and stretch each portion into long thick 'sausage' shape and loosely plait it, place it on a baking tray (shape it into a wreath) and let it rise again for 1 hour. When almost ready, pre-heat oven to 180 degrees C. Brush the top with egg wash and decorate with sesame seeds, flaked almonds and dyed boiled eggs (optional). Bake for around 45 mins, and at the half way mark cover loosely with foil to prevent over-browning. Take out of oven once ready and let cool.
