### **Cultural Notes**

As October begins and full spring growth gets rapidly underway, a regular pest and disease prevention program should be well underway. As with everything 'prevention is better than cure' and a regular maintenance program will ensure the best roses possible.

As roses need to be able to draw nutrients up from the soil, weekly watering with GoGo Juice will help to improve and maintain the soil bacteria and support the rose bush roots to draw up the essential nutrients. This is particularly important during the growing season and during the dry conditions we are experiencing. The amount of nutrients that the rose can absorb is regulated by the amount of

heat and moisture in the soil. An inadequate watering regime will result in fewer nutrients being absorbed and lead to smaller flowers and stunted rose bushes. Despite the solid downpour of rain that we had in September, the conditions are still very dry and a regular program of watering will help keep your rose stems and blooms growing and thriving.

If you water in the evening, make sure that you don't water over the foliage as leaving the foliage wet for longer than seven hours can encourage fungal diseases to develop and transfer to other rose bushes.

The moisture sitting on the leaf surface activates the fungus. The fungus is unable

to activate if the leaf surface is continuously wet for a lesser period of time. When a spot comes to a leaf vein it crosses it and infected plants defoliate slowly from the bottom up. If the characteristic black spot appears on the lower leaves then damage has already occurred. These leaves are going to turn yellow and then fall off. Fungicides available from local nurseries and hardware stores are effective if applied consistent with the instructions on the label. Almost all of them give protection for 5-7 days. Creating a regular spraying regime is the best way to prevent black spot.

Unfortunately, the recent, welcome rain and the rising temperatures



have made ideal conditions for black spot to appear. Don't panic, if it has appeared already. Pick off the damaged leaves and clean up any fallen leaves to reduce the likelihood of the spores falling into the soil or transferring to other rose bushes. Do not compost them, but put them in a bag and dispose of in the garbage bin. Eco-fungicide, Triforine and Mancozeb Plus (mancozeb with sulphur) are the most effective prevention and treatment methods for black spot.

As the weather heats up and the gusty, spring equinox winds begin, start to look for your red coloured, basal water shoots that will emerge from the graft. Remember to treat these soft stems gently and ensure they are tied securely so they do not break in the equinoxal winds. These water shoots will be the most productive rose bearing stems next year, so they need to be nurtured and cared for now.

### **Bigger Blooms**

If growing roses for competition and exhibition, you want long rose stems for the house or to give away, now is the time to regularly finger prune. It doesn't require any tools but your thumb and finger to rub off any unwanted buds as soon as they are large enough.

In each hybrid tea rose bush there is the possibility of three eyes. The centre one usually develops first and if it is damaged the two on the sides will



break dormancy and begin to grow.

Sometimes, particularly during the spring, these side buds start to grow very quickly, resulting in small spindly flower stems instead of one large bloom. Pinch them out to let the centre bloom thrive.

Floribundas and minifloras are treated slightly differently when finger pruning. They form multi-head sprays from their centre bud first. This centre bud will grow large and die before the other buds reach maturity. Pinching the centre flower out when it is just a soft bud, will ensure that the other buds will grow together into a nice spray with bigger flowers.

There will be small groups of participants rotating between the different demonstrations providing the maximum opportunity for everyone to learn and enjoy the day.
