Cultural Notes

I believe new beds have been prepared and rosarians are happily waiting for their bare rooted roses to arrive or many of you may have already purchased from Bunnings or BigW. We have purchased some of these roses and they have been planted.

If you are unable to plant your roses once they arrive you can soak them overnight or at the most three to five days in a half strength solution of Seasol. Either plant in ground or pots. If you still don't have time to plant them; then heel them in - meaning cover with a light coating of soil and ensure the plants do not dry out until you plant them.

Standard or tree roses will require the same treatment as your bush or climbing roses when planting. One suggestion is to ensure you stake the plant as it is still young and the wind can snap of the bud union. Do not tie with metal. Best to use old pantyhose or soft stretchy ties just below the bud union. Water in with Seasol and do not let dry out.

Do not fertilize your new plants. This is usually done in September or at least six weeks after planting. Roots are easily burnt by the fertilizer.

Note, that here in the Nepean we prune our roses from mid July to late August or once the frosts have gone. One or two frost days are okay with newly pruned roses but once growth starts they can get frost burn and stunt the new growth.

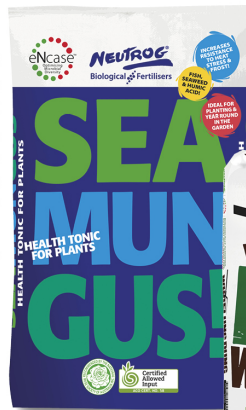

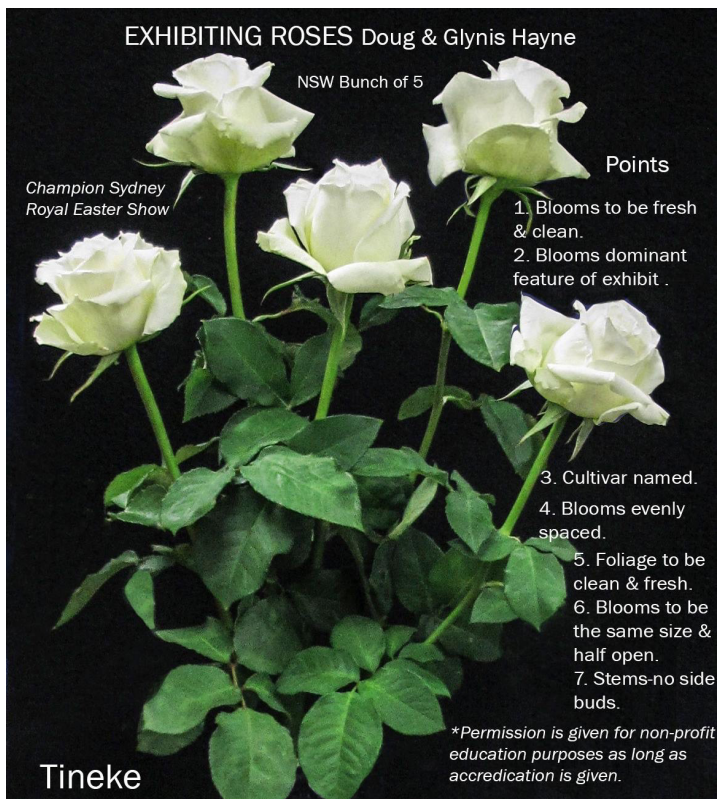

Shrub Roses

Points

1. Blooms are to be typical of the type
2. Blooms dominant feature of the exhibit.
3. Blooms and foliage to be fresh and clean.
4. No crushing or excessive gaps.
5. Side buds are permitted.
6. Balanced for size, height and width.
7. Stamens if visible fresh.
8. Cultivar named.

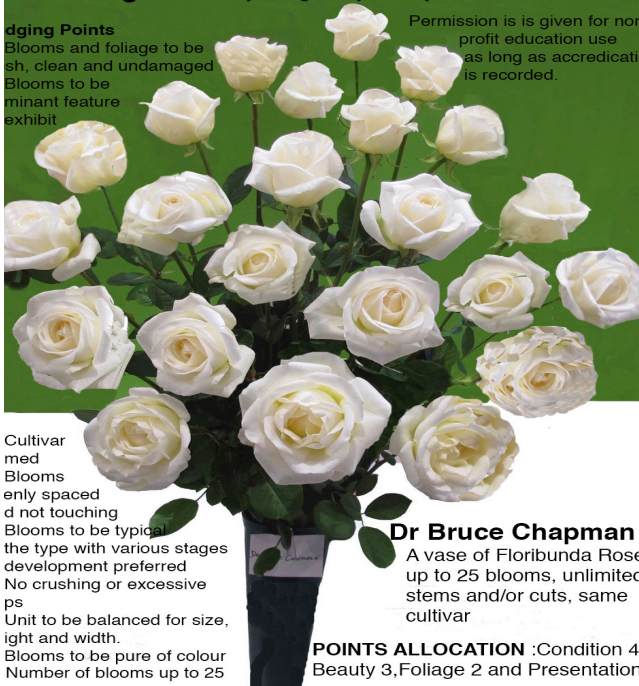

Exhibiting Points

Blooms and foliage to be fresh, clean and undamaged
Blooms to be dominant feature of exhibit

Permission is given for non-profit education use as long as accreditation is recorded.



Cultivar named
Blooms evenly spaced and not touching
Blooms to be typical of the type with various stages of development preferred
No crushing or excessive gaps
Unit to be balanced for size, height and width.
Blooms to be pure of colour
Number of blooms up to 25

A vase of Floribunda Rose up to 25 blooms, unlimited stems and/or cuts, same cultivar

Judging Criteria

1. Cultivar named
2. Blooms and foliage to be fresh and clean.
3. Blooms dominate the unit
4. Vibrant colour
5. Blooms to be at correct stages (i.e. full, exhibition, bunch and bud) evenly space and proportional.
6. Centre of full bloom to be fresh and showing stamens
7. Bud to show colour, petals not starting to unfurl and sepals to be disregarded
8. Stems clean, round, proportional and at 90 deg. to the horizontal



Points

1. Blooms at final stage of opening.
2. Blooms must show stamens.
3. Stamens to be fresh.
4. Blooms and foliage to be clean fresh and undamaged.
5. Blooms to be pure of colour.
6. Blooms to be circular in outline and showing good form.
7. Side buds not permitted.
8. The removal of petaloids is not permitted.
9. Blooms to be the same size.
10. Foliage should be adequate enough to give balance.
11. Cultivar named.
