Maintenance Time

It's winter pruning season and we need to service secateurs and saws.

Wipe the secateurs down with warm, soapy water after each pruning session to keep them nice and clean. Then rub the blades with vegetable oil to prevent them from rusting. If the blade seems blunt, run a sharpening stone over it. Blunt secateurs are not only hard to cut with, they can also damage your plants, leaving them vulnerable to disease.



A bigger maintenance challenge is the pruning saw.

Sharpening can be difficult. An easier option is to take them to a professional.

However, if you are into DIY and have the correct tools it's time.

Best advice is to always use protective gloves when working with pruning saws.
