CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Welcome to the new members who have joined recently. We hope to see you at a meeting. Do you have any questions about the care and maintenance for roses you purchased from Wagner's Nursery?

On February 4th we met at our usual venue, the Newington Community Centre, and members had sufficient blooms to hold a rose preparation and problem solving evening. **Hopefully members will now be more knowledgeable and feel more confident to enter into shows. Try your hand at a monthly meeting where guidance will be given by some successful exhibitors. Ask for assistance.**

The March film night was enjoyable. It was not your usual 'society how to do it' but a story about a French rose breeder who inadvertently breeds an award winning rose and the people around who help her. Amazingly we had some exhibits on the showbench that survived the rain downpour.

Your Summer pruning/trimming may have been set-back by the rain but don't let this stop you now doing some trimming. Rain is said to help bushes prepare for the next flowering period. Rain is beneficial, but this time floods have devastated many areas. If you have been affected by excess water we hope you are not too severely affected and

your home is safe. Gardens can be replanted.

Our next meeting is Friday, 1st April at Newington. The show schedule covering the special National classes at Kiama National Show at the end of April will be discussed so members can fully understand all the details for exhibitors. Visitors may see many varieties or cultivars that will encourage future purchases.

But prior to our April meeting you are asked to register for the National Rose Conference by using the detailed form from the last NSW Rose or from the webpage. Numbers are needed so event bookings and accommodation requirements are finalised. Please mention you belong to the Rose Society of NSW for the cheaper rate at the motel as vacancies are filling fast.

Our monthly meetings are a good place to learn about preparing and putting blooms onto the show bench. If you get the bush growing correctly blooms always follow.

<i>FLORAL ART</i> - no entries			
<i>BEGINNERS OR NOVICES</i>			
Class 11 is expressly for Novices. You are invited to place <u>one stem or cut of any rose variety</u> in this class. A cut carries one bloom and bud / buds or more than one bloom with or without side buds. A stem has one developed flower, i.e. no bud or flower has been removed to encourage growth in the remaining bloom. Any new member can enter into this class.			

EXTRA CLASS

Any potted plant in a pot up to 30cms (12") diameter.

Where is your competitive spirit?

The above class of a potted plant operates all year round.

SOIL TESTER

Do you have the means to easily test the PH level in your rose garden?. We have a PH soil test meter. Just push it into moist soil wait a few minutes and the answer appears on a dial at the top of the unit. If and when you borrow the unit you will be expected to return it in good condition. If it is lost, broken or damaged while in your possession you will be held responsible to replace the unit. A register to record each member as they borrow the tester will be kept and the borrower will need to return the tester to the Chairman at her home or at the following monthly Friday meeting.

CULTURAL NOTES

The earlier cultural notes had a 'bit each way' on the weather expected. There was no way of knowing that it would turn into a deluge that has caused problems with houses and gardens. They have forecast more rain over the next month or two.

Autumn provides us with the most beautiful roses of the year, but it may be later than mid April owing to the deluge, as a lack of sunlight causes growth to slow down. The colours will be much richer because the intensity of the sun is reduced therefore less bleaching of the blooms occurs. Blooms are usually larger due to the cooler nights.

The nutrients have most probably been washed from the soil, a little fertilizer in early April will help the bushes absorb food for the winter dormancy. A foliar version can be used instead if you really need to fertilize. There is usually no need to fertilize from May to August, beginning again in September.

Do you still have mulch left on the garden? If not, you are advised to add mulch cover now to help the soil recover and suppress weed growth. Mulch also keeps plant roots warm during the colder Winter period. Lucerne hay and sugar cane are the preferred mulch as it provides nutriment for the soil as it breaks down. Fresh organic matter like grass clippings and wood chips take nitrogen from the soil as they break down. Autumn conditions may have already started, but the soil will still be too wet to start any kind of garden digging or new bed preparation. Moving a bush from the garden into a pot can be done now, as long as you have prepared the soil or use a commercial product. Some will grow better in a pot than in the garden bed. Roses growing in pots will need watering before the garden grown ones unless you did not get as much rain as the majority of the State coastal areas. Check before watering. If your bushes have spindly growth, (stems less/below pencil thickness) then you should trim.

Trimming is the removal of spindly canes to encourage new growth that will have a bloom at the tip for most hybrid teas while a bunch of buds on a floribunda. You should not remove too much healthy foliage from the bush. Cut or trim the entire bush if needed to remove spindly growth but only cut down to the last two sets of leaves, (this also applies when cutting stems for the house) from which the next flower stems will grow.

Water shoots may start to appear as a result of all the rain received in the last month. If we get strong winds they will need protection by attaching them loosely to a wooden stake to stop the new growth being torn off at the base.

Aphids have decided that new growth will be just right for them. Spray with the product best suited for your needs. A systemic spray will be best to rid your bushes of aphids as it goes into the sap and is not washed off by rain. Aphids multiply very quickly.

Using anti-fungal sprays has been difficult between the days of rain. High humidity will help fungal disease. Grey mould (Botrytis) will likely be present on your multi-petaled blooms. There is nothing you can do except cut off ASAP and discard damaged bloom to the garbage bin.

If you spray every 7-10 days with the appropriate chemicals then there is little chance the leaves will succumb to black spot or powdery mildew. Powdery mildew appears as light grey or white powdery spots on foliage and can appear on new growth when we have warm days and cooler nights.

You do not have to leave your house to be tempted about buying new roses. Now is the ideal time to order or view online new catalogues from rose suppliers here and interstate. Order early to avoid disappointment. Swanes Nursery at Dural and GreenE Plants (Roses) at Galston deserve a visit to see what plants you can be coerced into wanting.

Preparation of new garden beds will have to wait for the soil to become drier. Manures and decomposing mulch will help with water retention and soil composition so your new or moved roses will have the best of growing conditions. The best suggestion is to prepare early. Do not wait for the new roses to arrive. New beds should be dug a spade deep (about 50cm) and let stand for a few weeks before turning the soil over as well as the manure and compost. Superphosphate can be added to the soil, when incorporating manures. Some Neutrog Seamungus can be added to the bottom of the hole when planting the rose.

More details next issue about moving an existing bush.

Purple roses get their colour from the breakdown of red pigments, not from a mix of red and blue. Researchers in the US, Japan and Australia are trying to create a blue rose by splicing the 'blue genes' of the petunia or delphinium onto the DNA of the rose.

<p>Some flowers come with the above benefits, it does suit roses, but the weather has made it hard to obtain fresh rose blooms from your garden. In Floral Art you do not necessarily have to have grown the flower or foliage used in arrangements, so you have the choice of any kind of design, free flowing multiple blooms, Modern using minimum materials or a simple bowl of flowers. You must use more than one bloom, but it could be a multiple headed stem with blooms that have some perfume. The word perfume- means a different thing to everyone. Any hint of perfume is okay for this title.</p>	<p>First item – obtain a card with a flower or flowers displayed. You have a wide choice for selection either Mothers’ Day, engagement, birthday, any kind of anniversary, etc. Try if possible to match the colour/s of your flowers/s you are using. You do not need to match all the various colours that may be on the card. You will need to display the card near your design. If it has a single flower, which may be a rose then you can use one bloom in a nice bud vase with a little foliage. If it is a basket of flowers then you should consider also using a basket for your design.</p>

DID YOU KNOW?

Only female mosquitoes bite and drink blood. Male mosquitoes do not bite - they are vegetarians and feed on the nectar of flowers. Mosquito repellents don’t actually repel. The spray blocks the mosquito’s sensors so they don’t know you’re there. Mosquitoes are attracted to the colour blue more than any other colour. The smallest mammal in the world is Thailand’s Kittis hog-nosed bat which is about the size of a bumblebee. One bat can catch over 1,000 mosquitoes in an hour.

named for prominent Australian rosarian, Dean Stringer, founding secretary of the National Rose Trial Garden in Adelaide and the inaugural National Rose Society Chairman of Judges. He has been a mentor to many and an example to all.



'SINGAPORE FAR EAST MOON', A COMPACT HT



This rose commemorates the lives of the 21 Australian Army Nurses killed by Japanese soldiers on Bangka Island on February 16, 1942 and is in memory of all World War 2 Far East Prisoners of War and Civilian Internees.

2022 is the 80th anniversary of the Fall of Singapore. On February 15, 1942, 15,000 Australian servicemen were placed in Changi prison. Many were sent to work on the Thai Burma railway, where 12,000 Allied servicemen, including 2,700 Australians, died. The 'Singapore Far East

Moon' rose will help families to remember these people.

Less well known is that over 44 boats carrying evacuees - largely women, children and elderly men, and servicemen en route to Java - left Singapore in the days just before the Fall. 40 of these boats were bombed and sunk, with loss of life of about 5000 people. Those who

reached land were killed or imprisoned in harsh prison camps, where one half of the men and one third of the women died during the following 3 and a half years.

The tragic massacre of 21 Australian Army Nurses, civilians and 60 servicemen who reached shore from their bombed boats occurred on Radji Beach, Bangka Island, on February 16, 1942. Nurse Vivian Bullwinkel was the sole Nurse survivor of this massacre. The 65 Nurses from the SS Vyner Brooke, (comprising 12 who drowned, 21 who were massacred, 8 who died in the prison camps and the 24 who survived the War caring for other prisoners), were commemorated by the Australian Government by a 20-cent coin in 2017, for the 75th Anniversary of 1942.

Mr Vivian Bowden, Australia's Official Representative to Singapore was shot and killed in Muntok, near Radji Beach on February 17, 1942.

Memorial services are now held in Muntok, Bangka Island each February 16 to remember these victims. Australian, British and New Zealand Embassies attend, together with Army Nurses' and Civilians' families. A Walk for Humanity is held on the Beach, where all present hold hands and walk towards the water, as the Nurses did in 1942 before being shot, and all hope and pray for Peace. In 2020, a Tree for Peace was planted in the former Japanese camp commandant's garden in Muntok. This Tree is a rose bush.

ROSES THAT THRIVE IN AUSTRALIA

Everything will be coming up roses if you plant one of these exquisite varieties. *(Ack the internet)*

Seeing a garden full of roses is always a beautiful sight. The elegance and lovely fragrance of this blossoming bud elevates any garden, making it easy to see why this flower is so popular with landscape designers and garden enthusiasts alike.



While they may appear dainty, many rose varieties are robust and easy to care for. Aside from their beauty, these rose varieties are popularly grown for their hardiness and ability to perform in less than perfect conditions.



'GRAND SIECLE' *(Photo: Getty)*

This hybrid tea rose grows in Victoria's Yarra Valley and releases an intensely fruit fragrance. With adequate watering in dry times, the flowers can be up to 20cm across. Blooms tend to be pearl-pink in hot

summers. Tea roses are drought tolerant and perfect for Australian conditions.



'PIERRE DE RONSARD'

With its attractive nodding habit, the 'Pierre de Ronsard' boasts old-fashioned charm even though it was initially bred in 1987 especially for Mediterranean climates. This climbing rose produces large full blooms that vary from soft blush to a full mid pink.



'SALLY HOLMES' (Photo: Claire Takacs)

Added to the World Rose Hall of Fame in 2012, 'Sally Holmes' is a strong-growing shrub that is lightly scented and regularly in bloom. It may also be trained as a climbing rose. It produces beautiful apricot buds that transform into creamy white blooms. Aside from its lovely appearance, 'Sally Holmes' roses are loved for their excellent disease resistance.

'ICEBERG'

The ever-popular 'Iceberg' rose, first bred in Germany in 1958, is a common sight in gardens across Australia. It flowers in all weather and is almost thornless, with a compact, bushy growth. This hardy and vigorous variety is repeat flowering, disease resistance and ideal to grow in large pots or as hedges.



'BUFF BEAUTY'

The hybrid musk 'Buff Beauty', which thrives in Australia's southern states, throws out long stems that make it a desirable climber and ideal for arches. This tall-growing rose shrub can boast over 41 petals per flower and omits a strong tea-rose scent.

'COCONUT ICE'

'Coconut Ice' is a Floribunda rose (1.2x0.8m). The unusual bicolour of these luscious, cup-shaped blooms from Treloar Roses features rich musk pink with soft white on the reverse of each petal. The blooms occur in clusters of three to five flowers, on a neat, upright bush with firm stems. The dark, lustrous foliage is resistant to disease.

THE FLOWER GARDEN IN AUSTRALIA

by Mrs T A Browne 1893

Mrs T A Browne, wife of Rolf Boldrewood, author of *Robbery Under Arms*, wrote Australia's first book on gardening by a woman, published in 1893. She named it 'The Flower Garden in Australia' and dedicated it to the Countess of Jersey.

She lived as a child at Denham Court, Ingleburn on land which her grandfather, Captain Brooks, had purchased in 1812. The garden and delightful house, designed by John Verge in 1814 is still extant.

Mrs Browne's charming and historically interesting book is grouped into calendar seasons, and is written in an entertaining and intimate way, much of it being applicable to Australian conditions today.

She appears to have had wide horticultural knowledge and good practical sense: February is described as a 'most trying month for gardens and green-houses, requiring much water and to be not sparingly given'. She refers continually to the bush house, 'an inexpensive

substitute for the greenhouse' and her delightful book concludes with a vivid account of the variety of native flowers: 'something fresh and new everywhere to delight the eye, yet you hear people complain of the sameness of Australian scenery when you might almost say that every district has its own particular flora.

Although by this time many writers and artists had recorded their impressions of Australia, more and more important visitors came to see the new land for themselves. Mark Twain, when making his world lecture tour in 1895, left some picturesque commentaries on Victoria's city and country houses and gardens in his *Following The Equator* (1897).

Embrace with joy the changing seasons
For each yields its own abundance
The Energy and Birth of Spring
The Growth and Contentment of
Summer
The Wisdom of letting go of the leaves
of Autumn
The Rest and Quiet Renewal of Winter.
