FLORAL ART - Meryl Morphett – 20 points

BEGINNERS OR NOVICES

Class 11 is expressly for Novices. You are invited to place <u>one stem or cut of any</u> <u>rose variety</u> in this class. A cut carries one bloom and bud / buds or more than one bloom with or without side buds. A stem has one developed flower, i.e. no bud or flower has been removed to encourage growth in the remaining bloom. Any new member can enter into this class.

EXTRA CLASS

Any potted plant in a pot up to 30cms (12") diameter.

Where is your competitive spirit?

The above class of a potted plant operates all year round.

SOIL TESTER

Do you have the means to easily test the PH level in your rose garden?. We have a PH soil test meter. Just push it into moist soil wait a few minutes and the answer appears on a dial at the top of the unit. If and when you borrow the unit you will be expected to return it in good condition. If it is lost, broken or damaged while in your possession you will be held responsible to replace the unit. A register to record each member as they borrow the tester will be kept and the borrower will need to return the tester to the Chairman at her home or at the following monthly Friday meeting.

FLORAL ART JUNE 2022 'Winter Begins' Any embellishments In Floral Art you do not necessarily have to have grown the flower or foliage used in arrangements. Bare branches can signify Winter or white flowers to give the feeling of cold or snow. Winter can signify a minimum of material. Winter bulbs can be used out of their pots or soil and replanted the following day to continue their growth. Camellia blooms are Winter flowers that go well with weathered branches or driftwood. Foliage/s from your garden will go well for the title 'Winter Begins'. You do not need to have flowers in your arrangement this month, so, foliage that is colourful, glossy, dull or strappy can be used (foliage arrangement). A good mix of various foliages can create a stunning design. Your focal area can be filled with colourful eye-catching foliage surrounded by complementary foliage. A dried large	FLORAL ARTJULY 2022'Weather Forecast'Any flowers, any embellishments.You have a wide choiceof design this month.Will it be cold and windy, expecting some snow, early Spring, days of rain ahead, etc. You do not have to keep it to Winter as Winter is not mentioned in the title. You need to state the forecast. If you think it will be windy, then your design should give the impression of wind in your design, leaning a certain way or being twisted together by the breeze. Twigs and vines can be used to help with the windy forecast.

summer flower (etc.) could be used with a few leaves or twigs to make a Modern Design. Artificial colouring of the bloom is not allowed. You do not want to present a design fully comprised of dried material unless there is some colourful component.	Maybe it will be leaning left to suit the materials on hand. Vertical could be a tornado or whirlpool. Your imagination is needed for this title.

Have you placed your order for those new rose bushes? Have you had time to prepare the new garden bed, new rose hole with fresh soil or the soil for those pots? You still have time to clean and sharpen your secateurs and pruning saw in preparation for pruning time in August if you live in a frost-free area, if not wait until the end of the frost period which may be September. Pruning guidelines will be printed and images shown in the next magazine due at the end of July. Frost on new tender shoots will turn them brown and you will have to wait for replacement new shoots to appear. There will be a video about pruning at our June 3rd meeting allowing ample time to organise your pruning plan.

Optimum growing conditions require 6-8 hours of direct sunlight each day. Some floribunda types will tolerate a little shade but sun and rose bushes go together. Floribunda cultivars will give greater continuity of bloom and are usually more tolerant to inclement weather than hybrid tea roses, but it is best not to try to get the best of both worlds by planting them together in the same bed, as their growth habit can be so different.

Do you have a bush that isn't looking happy in its present position? It has a special spot in your heart and you would like to keep it. It may be in the wrong soil type – too wet or too dry, not enough sun, too windy, there are some bushes that confound the gardener. Will it be happier in a pot, so try before spade pruning. If you have a diseased bush, turf it out! Spade pruning - to the compost bin or garbage. This action may seem extreme but why spend time and money to keep a non growing rose holding a spot that could be more productive with a new rose bush.

If you want to re-use the same space you need to remove all roots and take about a barrow full of soil from the area and fill the hole with good garden spoil. Place the removed soil in another part of your garden away from your roses. Some rosarians do not remove any soil, as they are just moving a bush to a different location not discarding it because it has died or is diseased.

If the removed rose is going into a pot make sure the pot is larger than the root ball. Prepare the soil in advance as mentioned in earlier issues. It is best to remove and replant into a pot in the cooler months not in the heat of Summer. The bush will need to be pruned and the roots trimmed. Inspection of the existing roots are important as damaged roots need to be trimmed. Leaving them damaged (untrimmed) will allow disease to enter into the plant.

If you find curl grubs in your garden and pots you will need to apply the treatment for Brown Lawn Beetles which is available at all good nurseries and garden centres. Follow the instructions supplied on the bottle. Maybe they did not like the drowning conditions in the lawn and moved house. The evidence of these culprits is failure to grow, even start to die, as they feed on the roots of the plant. You may see brown patches in your lawn and these grubs will be found just under the surface.

If you have a garden bed that is not working well in growing roses then you may need to have your soil tested. The right soil ph is important along with the growing medium helping the soil hold moisture and nutrients. If you have over fertilized the garden your plants may suffer from a lack of vigour and deteriorate. This could have happened owing to having too much fertilizer in the soil. It is assumed that the heavy rain would have flushed out some of the fertilizer and the build-up would now be less. In any case a soil test may be the best option. Too much of a particular nutrient can cause a problem within the soil and fertilizer is locked out from the plant's roots. If your roses are growing well, and the ph is right leave them alone.

PLANTING A POTTED ROSE

Container grown rose bushes can be planted anytime but the cooler weather allows them to settle in before the next flowering period.

Make sure the soil is moist before removing it from the pot.

Bare -rooted plants need longer to settle in than potted ones, as their roots need to develop and grow. This will not happen until the soil starts to get warm.

When planting container grown plants you make the hole wider than the width of the pot and slightly deeper. Use the pot to make sure of the width and depth. You want the top of the pot soil to be at the same height as the edge of the hole. You need to encourage the roots to leave the



root ball of the pot so the surrounding soil needs to be friable for the roots to extend and grow successfully so be careful of the surrounding soil type. You may need to slightly ease roots away from the root ball into the new soil being added

Trim off any damaged roots with sharp secateurs. Hold the root ball firmly, backfill with the prepared soil. Three quarter fill the space then gently fill the void with water and allow the soil to settle then top up with more soil. Water again. Do not stamp down on the soil.

Remember to put the stake in first before planting a standard (tree rose) bush. The stake needs to go just under the top bud union. Tie to the stake in a figure 8 fashion using soft pliable material, e.g., stocking. Standard roses are not bush roses. Bush roses are located at ground level while standards are long stems with a grafted rose variety at the top.



PLANTING AND Choosing a bare Root rose

When choosing a bare root rose the canes should be plump, not wrinkled. The roots should be moist inside the packet.

PROPER LOCATION (Sun, air circulation) Place your bare root roses where they will get at least 6 hours of direct sunlight and good air circulation (but not in strong wind).

PREPARED SOIL: Option

<u>A</u>: Incorporated manure and compost with maybe blood and bone added or/and Seamungus. Watered weekly before planting. About 6 weeks ago.

Option B: with planting mix or aged compost, planting immediately is okay because your added soil is already compost and the incorporated blood and bone, etc., will be there when needed by the fine new roots. Some add a layer of Seamungus onto the mound so there is food for the new growing plant. Be careful in what you add as strong fertilizer will burn the new roots. Blood and Bone is a slow release additive.

TOOLS & SUPPLIES: Shovel, pruners, a large bucket or similar container for holding the bare root roses. Soak roots in water for 24 hours or heel them in by temporarily planting in loose moist soil (up to a week). Remove from packing material before soaking in bucket or heeling them into the ground.

TRIM BROKEN ROOTS OR

CANES: Treat with bleach (optional). Solution of 10% sodium hypochlorite bleach (1part bleach to 9 parts water). You can dunk your bare root roses in this 10% solution, wetting them completely and then air-dry (on spread-out newspapers). Be careful when disposing of bleach! Trim any broken roots as these breaks may allow disease to enter. Trim off any broken tips of canes or ends that do not look clean.

DIG A GENEROUS HOLE: or use an ample container large enough to spread out the plant's roots without cutting or bending them. For bush roses, like hybrid teas, dig a hole 60cms deep and 60cms wide or at least 45cms deep and wide.

RICH SANDY LOAM Use

potting soil or add planting mix to sandy topsoil (Ipart mix to 2 parts soil).

SUPPORT ROOT

STRUTURE: Mound the soil to form a solid pyramid of soil or container and spread the roots over it.

BUD UNION POSITON: The plant's bud union or "graft" should be slightly higher than the surrounding soil, about 100 - 150mms. Fill hole with soil mix, firming as you go, up to existing soil level.

WATERING BASIN: Form a dam around the perimeter of the hole. Water thoroughly, right after planting, to settle the soil. Try "puddling in" - take a watering hose put a nozzle on it, turn it on to get a good stream and plunge it in around the roots in several places. The water will find any air pockets and flush them out letting soil fill the spaces. MOUNDING: Some rose experts recommend that you cover the newly planted rose almost completely with mulch uncovering it only after new growth starts.

KEEP SOIL JUST MOIST until new top growth appears and then as needed to keep growth continuing. Your new roses will not require much watering until new leaves appear.

THE 'CHARLES MALLERIN' ROSE

I was reading Ludwig's December Newsletter when I was struck by the photo of the 'Charles Mallerin' rose. 'Mister Lincoln' and 'Papa Meilland' are favourite roses of mine and I grow both. Maybe at some time I've also grown 'Oklahoma' but if so, it departed a long time ago.

I quote Ludwig: 'Charles Mallerin' used to be the favourite red in the fifties. After fathering 'Papa Meilland', 'Mister Lincoln' and

'Oklahoma' it went into retirement.

From 'Helpmefind' on the internet: Dark red Hybrid Tea.

Registration name: 'Charles Mallerin' (Hybrid Tea, Meilland, before 1947) Bred by Francis Meilland (1912-1958) (France, before 1947).



Introduced in France by Meilland et Cie in 1947 as 'Charles Mallerin'. Introduced in United Kingdom by Wheatcroft Brothers Ltd. in 1948 as 'Charles Mallerin'.

Introduced in Australia by Hazlewood Bros. Pty. Ltd. in 1950 as 'Charles Mallerin'.

Introduced in United States by Conard-Pyle (Star Roses) in 1951 as 'Charles Mallerin'.

Hybrid Tea.

Crimson, darker shading, red reverse. Blackish crimson, rich texture, sparse bloomer. Strong, damask, fruity fragrance. 35 to 45 petals. Average diameter 15cms (6"). Very large, full (26-40 petals), flat bloom form. Blooms in flushes throughout the season. Tall, armed with thorns / prickles, bushy, upright. Large, matte, dark green, leathery foliage.

Height: 47" (120cm).

Spring Pruning: Remove old canes and dead or diseased wood and cut back canes that cross. In warmer climates, cut back the remaining canes

by about one-third. In colder areas, you'll probably find you'll have to prune a little more than that. Parentage: (Rome Glory x Congo) x Tassin (explanation for those not familiar with rose terminology, Seed cultivar was (Rome Glory x Congo) plant pollen supply from Tassin results Charles Mallerin).

'Charles Mallerin' grows in a lopsided and awkward manner. It produces few basal breaks and few side stems. It defoliates early losing the lower leaves quickly. The blooming stems are very long. The rose labeled as 'Charles Mallerin' at the San Jose Heritage Rose Garden may be 'Mrs. F.W. Sanford'. (end of quotes from the internet)

So, it was introduced into Australia by Hazlewood Bros in 1950 which is the time that Don Campton worked there. The 1953 Hazlewood catalogue states that 'it has large fragrant dark crimson blooms with a high centre. Strong leathery foliage and a free flowering habit after the style of 'Rouge Mallerin', but a much better grower'.

Don Campton remembers the rose well. 'It was the first of the deep red roses' he said. 'A strong, upright grower, the only fault as far as I was concerned, was that it defoliated early – not unlike 'Papa Meilland'. All red roses seem to get lost more easily – for instance 'Papa Meilland' became more popular than 'Charles Mallerin'. As far as Don can remember, 'Charles Mallerin' never hit the show benches despite it being a 'damn good garden rose'. For quite some time, 'Charles Mallerin' was the number one red rose requested in customers' orders. 'Tassin' is another example of red roses only having a brief window of fame – like 'Charles Mallerin' it, too, came and went.

A politician visited a village and asked what their needs were. The village leader replied: "We have two basic needs, honourable sir. Firstly, we have a hospital, but no doctor." On hearing this the politician brought out his mobile phone. He spoke to someone for some time and then told the villagers that there would be a resident doctor starting in the village the next day.
