THE ROSE GARDEN January-February

- We expected with El Nino a very dry summer but have been surprised rather with lots of rain and humidity. This has set the conditions right and brought lots of <u>blackspot and rust</u> as well to those rose bushes that are less resistant to this fungus.
- Also, we should not be too deceived by the rainfall as often it is drizzly rain that does not penetrate deeply to the roots and we can find our garden surprisingly dry if we dig around the soil.
- Our roses will also be growing much taller and straggly and when there is a lot of heat the blooms can be much smaller as they open more quickly.

WHAT TO DO IN THE ROSE GARDEN IN THESE CONDITIONS:

1. **WATERING- How much water roses need?** (*These two points are taken from Brian Wagner's newsletter – see his January newsletter and videos that cover most of the items below:* https://www.wagnersrosenursery.com.au/pages/how-to-videos?

"Generally, roses require around 10 litres of water each, twice weekly, but in hotter times they should be watered at least three times weekly. Deep soakings are highly preferable over short bursts of watering, as it encourages the root system to grow down into the soil.

Overhead systems are great as they help the roots to spread and grow deep with water reaching further around the base of each plant rather than directly to one spot at the base of the stem. With overhead irrigation (sprays), watering should be done in the morning to ensure there is enough time for the water to dry out on the foliage. There is also much less evaporation in the morning than in the evening. " Brian Wagner Nursery January newsletter



- 2. Because of the continued dampness it is difficult to spray successfully to save the **roses from blackspot**. Ensure the soil is in good condition, mulched and fertilised, and the infected foliage is removed from beneath the rose bushes. Now is a good time whilst there is lots of moisture, to fertilise the rose bed, also to condition the soil with Seamungus, and then cover with another layer of mulch. This will help to keep in the moisture and stop the weed growth. The infected foliage will gradually fall from the rose bushes and new foliage appear. At least there have been few extremely hot days, but if it does become very hot protect the rose bushes with less foliage from the sun so the canes don't burn until the new fresh foliage appears.
- 3. **Deadheading/ Summer prune** As there has been a good flush of roses this year, it is important to keep up the deadheading. As the bushes become straggly and tall, deadhead or cut blooms further down the stem as a way of summer pruning the bush. A third of the bush can be pruned off at this time of

the year in preparation for the autumn flush.

4. ORDERING OF NEW ROSES FOR THE GARDEN-

Both Treloar Roses and Wagner's Nursery have been promoting the early ordering of bareroot roses for the winter planting for 2024. If you are after a specific and popular rose it is best to get in early with online purchases as the more popular roses sell out very quickly.


for her family. We also presented several members with an award for their participation and
