

THE ROSE GARDEN THIS MONTH-

PRUNING TIME - revisiting the pruning process:

Procedure: Ensure you have sharpened tools- secateurs, loppers and pruning saws, methylated spirits or some other antibacterial substance such as tea tree oil for cleaning secateurs and other tools between bushes and after cutting diseased canes; plastic bag to place diseased leaves into; a bag for cuttings for compost bins; gloves, preferably elbow length for your own protection; a brush and some Eco Oil for cleaning off scale from trunk and canes; lime Sulphur for spraying onto completed pruned rose.

PRUNE: Remember 4 D's - DISEASED DEAD DAMAGED DIDDLY BITS AND CROSSING CANES



Begin by cutting off the tops of the rose bush with the leaves etc., and remove leaves, place diseased leaves in a bag. Have a good look at the structure of the bush before moving on further. Suckers come from the roots under the bud union usually at an angle in the soil beneath the rose. Don't cut but pull the sucker out. Dig down if need be. Pick up leaves from under the bush and spray bush and soil around it with lime Sulphur.


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



Some advice from Sandra Turner President of Victoria Rose Society as in Neutrog Pooh Bah Times:

Bush Roses – Cut your bush back by half or by two thirds of its height. Remove all dead wood or old canes which did not produce good growth in the previous season. Also remove any thin and twiggy growth and remove crowded branches. Always prune to an outward facing bud and cut on a slight angle about ½ cm above the bud.

Standard Roses – Use the same procedure as above whilst retaining a rounded ball shape.

Climbers – Your climbing rose is unlikely to require pruning for the first few years. If it's a juvenile, just tidy and remove any dead branches. During its youth is the best time to get your climber into the position to be a real showstopper. If you monitor your climber for a few years, you'll be able to observe its flowering habits. After spring flowering is generally the best time to prune your climber by removing any laterals back to a strong frame. If you're planting a new climber, keep in mind that it's often much easier in a pruning sense to simply tie the rose to its support. If you weave stems in an out, it makes the plant more difficult to prune. Plants which are tied back can easily be untied, pruned, and tidied and then retied.

Do not remove the long new climbing canes, as these will produce next season's flowers. Tie canes into position over the arch, or fan out against the structure they're growing against. The more horizontally trained, the better. This will mean more laterals and therefore more flowers. Every couple of years, remove an old cane to ground level, which will encourage a strong new water shoot.

If you haven't already done so, now is the time to apply <u>Seamungus</u> throughout your garden. The soil will be bursting with health and life, and when you apply your first application of Sudden Impact for Roses in spring, the results will be brilliant. I always like to mulch after pruning as well, as access is easier and there are less thorns to deal with. You'll find that <u>Whoflungdung</u> keeps your soil temperature constant over winter, which means an optimum result when flowering starts. Let's face it – we rosarians do love the flower. *(From Neutrog Pooh Bah Times – June 2020)*

Come to our pruning day at Peace Park Kiama – Sunday July 16 10a.m.-3.00p.m. either to watch the demonstration, or to help prune the roses there. Every secateur there helps. Clean and sharpen your secateurs beforehand. Even to come for an hour will help.

STATE COUNCIL: Kristin advised that there is a new State Secretary, Stefica Bikes, who will remain until the AGM. **GENERAL BUSINESS:**

There are 14 Boxes of old records of the Society that are being stored by Janet Wright who is looking for a solution on future storage are they still needed as information has been documented in Judith Oyston's book on the history of the Rose Society.

Sue Marshall from Southern Sydney thanked us for the invitation to attend this meeting and invited everyone to their next meeting at Loftus on 17th June where there will be a representative from Neutrog speaking.

Hans challenged us to a Show and Tell where he had a very old Dictaphone to show us, a couple of members guessed what it was. Colin gave us a very informative talk on Human Beans, the new coffee-based product from Neutrog.

We then had a beautiful lunch at 1.15 pm followed by a guided walk through the beautiful garden by Hans and Lyn.

NEUTROG- next order closes on 10th August for early September delivery.

We don't fertilise from May until August, then when the foliage begins to appear in Spring – begin to fertilise. Now is the time to use some Seamungus when planting new bareroot roses, and when preparing the soil for planting.

Strike Back for Orchids is a good product to use with potted roses. Kahuna is great for camellias flowering now.
