#### **ROSE GARDEN IN SEPTEMBER**

Spring time – and the foliage will be looking spectacular. Time now to check for diseases and pests. Aphids can begin to fly in to feed on those tender shoots and, on hot days with cool nights, powdery mildew can begin to show on foliage of some of the rose bushes. A spray of 1 part full cream milk and 9 parts water can help to eradicate the powdery mildew. At least the hot dry weather we are experiencing will kill off fungicidal spores such as blackspot.

Mulching now as hot weather approaches is important to keep the ground cool, retain moisture and to stop the weeds from growing. I use WhoFlungDung with a mixture of CockNBull, and cover with any of the mulches – sugar cane, mushroom, lucerne etc... keep away from the trunk of the rose bush to stop rot, and make sure the ground has been well watered before layering the mulch.

If you haven't fertilised yet, it is time now to spread the Sudden Impact, or whatever rose fertiliser you prefer. Enjoy the Spring blooms.

#### **ROSE DISPLAY- SATURDAY 5 OCTOBER AT BURNETT'S ON BARNEY**

OUR MEETING - 24 AUGUST - DANIEL WEBB SPOKE ON ORCHIDS (ROSES NOT IN BLOOM IN AUGUST)



A few important ideas from the session:

- Orchids need to be potted not in Orchid mix, but 50% pine bark, 30% coconut fibre and 20% perlite;
- Water as needed by dipping the transparent pot with holes in sides in water for about an hour, drain before placing back in a pot (ice cubes are definitely not for watering tropical orchids);
- Orchids blooms are triggered by cold (12-

20 degrees) place in a cool room during part of winter to trigger the blooms.

### HELLO FROM FRANCE – GARY BICKFORD & JUDI HANSEN'S EXPERIENCE OF SUMMER IN FRANCE



Well, it is well and truly summer. Temperatures mostly high 20s to mid 30s although we did manage 40C last week. Of course, this does not bear well for the roses, but we have really missed the main flowering time of May and June. So here in August we are into their second or third flowering, but many of the roses are now finished their flowering cycle. There are still



plenty of blooms, and I thought you might like a bit of French colour in this month's newsletter. Here is a sample!! (they also have beautiful snails on their roses).

We are staying with our friends in the same house we stayed in 2022 in the south of France, near Toulouse and Carcassonne. The wheat has been harvested, the sunflowers are ripening, and the grapes still have a way to go before they are ready to be picked.

This is a view from our rooftop terrace looking out over the farmland.

We visited one of our neighbours who has a lovely garden and a pool. The house is only recently built, in the last 10



years, as opposed to our friend's house built 400 years ago. This photo is viewed from their pool, up the slope to the house. Salvias provide colour most of the year and at this time roses and lavender add to the picture.

Our friends have decided that we should plant a climbing rose. So,

here goes my attempt at planting my first rose in France. As I showed you on our last trip, the French cut these very small squares out of the concrete footpath and plant their roses in these small spaces.

My friend purchased a rather large (say a 40cm pot) potted rose for me to plant. After much coaxing I convinced the rose that this was its new home. It looks pretty good, so with a bit of water it should be OK. I will prune it before we leave at the end of October.





The rose is described thus: The Alibaba® Hybrid Tea climbing rose is a very pretty new rose that will form a very beautiful shrub which will be covered in flowers throughout the summer. Its roses are double, wavy, a beautiful salmon orange, but also very fragrant. They are highlighted by beautiful dark, semi-matte foliage, very resistant to



diseases. An easy, floriferous and resistant rose bush, within the reach of all gardeners (even Australians I hope).

I trust it is getting a little warmer there although it still looks like it is quite cold. At least you have had a bit of respite from the rain! *Cheers for now, Judi and Gary*
