#### August 2024

The new growth which bursts forth during this last month of winter should be matched by our enthusiasm for our favourite plants. The rewards are considerable when we consider the number of blooms produced and the display that they make.

Such results will only accrue if we match up the important factors for success. Hopefully we have selected cultivars which we will like and thrive in our environment. That should be an easy task when we consider the wide range of roses



available. On the one hand we may learn to love some roses which will last as long as we do. I could use Elina as an example there. However we should always be able to find space for a newer release. I try to avoid impulse buying but I recently bought two plants of Day-breaker. I had read about it in American publications and admired our daughter's splendid version of this highly acclaimed Floribunda.

It is not too late to plant new roses in August, even those which are bare-rooted. Potted roses tend to be around for the entire year. Often they are a good buy but there are always cases of plants which have been screaming for freedom. It would be good to be able to see the roots but certainly the foliage is a good indicator. Prices

can vary widely and bargains can be obtained as sales outlets are always keen to move on surplus stock.

Now that we have our roses underway we should commence our regular feeding program. The fundamentals are Seamungus and Sudden Impact for Roses. Late winter is a great time for seaweed and a month or so later for Neutrog's most famous product Sudden Impact. It is worth remembering that this Australian company commenced its association with the Rose Societies over 20 years ago and has withstood challenges from others. POPUL8 and various other products have been added to the Neutrog range. Read their newsletters and publications and listen to Dr Uwe to enhance your knowledge. I really hope that you have placed your orders for the next

t is pointless applying fertiliser if it is not watered in properly. We need action in the root zone before the new foliage emerges. Watering should be one of our easiest garden tasks. Holding the hose is a relaxing and worthwhile exercise. Sometimes we get a bonus when it rains. If too much rain falls we have hopefully constructed our beds so excess water can drain away. Have a good irrigation system

If roses are growing strongly and healthily they are less likely to be troubled by fungal diseases. Ideally we should spray them with environmentally friendly products. If used properly and regularly they should be just as effective and safer than the chemical versions. I usually use Eco Oil, Eco Carb and E-Seaweed to prevent blackspot and powdery mildew.

Some people are very concerned with aphids but in reality they are easy to counter. The nurseries have a wide range of products which can be sprayed to remove them. No longer is there a need to use poisonous chemicals. Good results can come from hosing those little pests off the foliage.

We spoke at length previously about the importance of mulching and that should work in conjunction with the above measures. If we are not getting good results it means that our heart is not in the task or we are not using the right methods.

Combine the production of good roses with the enjoyable social interaction which comes from being a happy Rose

Society member and you have the best formula. We need look no further than our dear friend Bruce Raines who passed away in July. He believed that if we belong to an organisation we should contribute to its functioning. In reality, roses were a lesser hobby for Bruce but he was a major player with exhibition poultry, dahlias, gesneriads and show administration in general. Above all he was as generous a person as you could ever meet and that generosity will always be remembered.



#### **AGM Notes**

### Why an AGM

Each year our organisation is legally required to hold an Annual General Meeting (AGM). They are important not only from a governance perspective but also provide a platform for members to share their views and ask questions. This helps to ensure the organisation is being run in the best interests of the members. AGMs also encourage transparency and opportunities to participatie effectively in our community group.

The AGM allows all members to:

- · clearly understand our financial position
- · review what we have done over the last year
- discuss the annual report
- set directions for the next year.

To help us achieve transparency and effectiveness to meet our legal and other requirements, our constitution requires us to refresh our office holders each year. This effectively means that all the positions that are held in the Macarthur Regional Rose Society automatically end on the date of the AGM. We then carry out a voting process to fill the postions to operate the Rose Society for the next year. Anyone can nominate for any position that is available and can be appointed by popular vote at the meeting.

No community organisation can operate successfully with only 4-6 people working very hard to do the many tasks required to make the group successful and enjoyable. The more people involved in the operation of the group the more successful, vibrant and useful it becomes to us all.

Renewal and sharing the load is important for all community groups. If we don't renew and share the load, the potential for the organisation to become stagnant and uninteresting is very real.





We join the Macarthur Rose Society because we are interested in and love roses and just as importantly, we generally enjoy each other's company. It is a focus for our rose growing, a common point of interest with other members with opportunities to learn and understand better rose growing and display.

#### **Roses to Grow**




Image above: If you are looking for a new rose to plant before spring arrives, the very appropriately named Glorious is worth considering. It a is a beautiful, buttery, yellow hybrid tea. Its large flowers are of classic double hybrid tea form that bloom well throughout the season. Glorious holds its colour in the heat, rarely marks when exposed to the rain and humidity.
